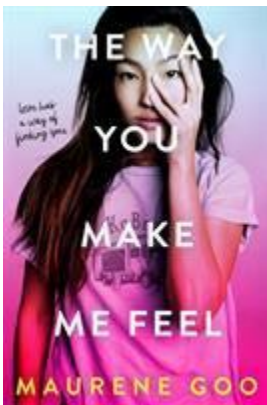




***The Perfect Guy Doesn't Exist* by Sophie Gonzales (2024)**

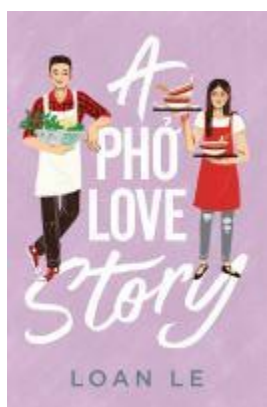


My Lady Jane by Cynthia Hand (2016)

Like that could go wrong.



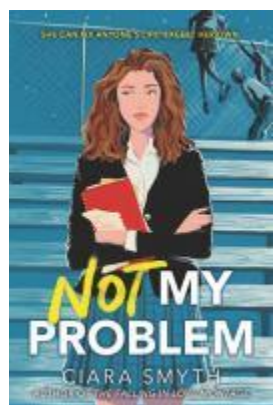
A Pho Love Story by Loan Le (2021)

After bombing a stand-up set at her own bat mitzvah, Winnie has kept her jokes to herself. Well, to herself and her dad, a former comedian and her inspiration. Then, on the second day of tenth grade, the funniest guy in school actually laughs at a comment she makes in the lunch line and asks her to join the improv troupe. Maybe he's even . . . flirting? Not My Problem by Ciara Smyth (2021)
